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CHAIR & CEO MESSAGE

While COVID-19 restrictions have eased across the globe, disability and aged care providers are still recovering from the pandemic.

The first half of this financial year was subject to ongoing restrictions, with the easing of restrictions having a twofold effect: while non-essential supports recommenced, virus exposure amplified exponentially, driving a wave of absenteeism among both staff and clients.

Aged care and disability support sectors joined NSW Health in maintaining stringent controls to offer additional protections, but these necessary steps came at a financial cost. However, this is a cost Coastlink was happy to pay to keep our staff and clients safe.

Moving forward, Coastlink, like all businesses and people across the world, is looking forward to moving beyond COVID-19 to resume normal operations, with some new opportunities and innovations even being realised during the pandemic.

This period provided Coastlink staff an opportunity to undertake additional training using our online platform. As an Employer of Choice, we encouraged all staff to take on additional online training sessions and offered employee incentives for completed modules. This not only improved our staff knowledge base, but also our support capabilities.

In aged care, we used the flexibility arrangements in our Commonwealth Home Support Programme funding to purchase tablets for 40 Coastlink aged care clients. The tablets helped our clients to maintain higher levels of socialisation, as well as learn computer skills to enable them to access services and make purchases from their own homes.

An exciting milestone this year means Coastlink now owns its Day Program venue.

The Berkeley Vale Activity Hub currently provides supports five days per week to our clients living with disability. It is conveniently located with close access to Mingara, food outlets, swimming centres, gymnasiums, lakefront bike and walking tracks, and has an oval right next door.

And this is just the beginning. Coastlink has not just purchased the property, it has also commenced redesigning our supports. The coming year will see a major reshuffle of supports that offer more options to more people.

We are looking to expand our disability support hours across the weekends and before and after school. Popular programs such as morning breakfast club, expanding our drama and music groups, afterhours events and activities such as karate, dancing or cooking are all being considered. Over the coming year, we will be working closely with our clients to deliver a client-led support program that best appeals to individual and collective interests.

To meet our growth vision, we need to upgrade our new centre. Plans have been drawn to expand the existing accessible amenities and add an additional accessible bathroom, complete with shower, toilet and enough room for a mobile change table.

And it's not just our Berkeley Vale Hub getting a revamp. Our Woy Woy Activity Hub is also midupgrade. Options for a community garden, sensory garden and a workshop shed are being investigated, with a feasibility study already underway.

Both venues will also soon be augmented with the introduction of our virtual reality (VR) capabilities to complement the existing Gaming Hubs, which currently consist of six computer stations at each venue.

In further expanding our services, purchase of a residential property near the Wyong Town Centre will be the site of our next set of owned and operated group homes.

The site in Alison Road, Wyong, will be developed to provide architecturally designed Specialist Disability Housing for Coastlink clients. The new facilities will be built at a Platinum Level to ensure they can cater for people requiring high physical supports, if needed.

Our Specialist Disability Accommodation being developed in collaboration with Casa Capace in Gorokan is expected to be completed in December 2022. Our six clients waiting for the build completion are soon to be rewarded with a state-of-the-art disability residence they can call home.

A recent survey identified staff and clients alike would like to see improved communications across the organisation.

We have listened to this feedback and have implemented several measures including the build of a new website. Our new website will increase interactivity with our clients, improve access to programs and activities, and allow for payments and booking of events online.

We have also commissioned a new Client Management System (CMS). The system will improve our business capacity and capability, allowing for growth without additional employee and resource expenses. More importantly, a new client portal will further increase our communication with all clients. The system will allow clients to access

their schedules online, and update their personal information directly into the system.

In Board Member news, one of our long-standing and much-loved Directors, Helen Roberts, will be retiring from our Board in October 2022. Helen has been with Coastlink for close to 20 years. A former CEO of Community Transport Central Coast, Helen has brought a wealth of knowledge and passion to our organisation and was instrumental in the direction and growth of Coastlink during her tenure.

Helen will be offered Coastlink's first lifetime membership as recognition of her service. Coastlink Lodge at Watanobbi will also be renamed in her honour as Roberts House. We wish Helen all the best and look forward to her continuing to be a part of the Coastlink family in a less formal capacity.

As always, we must give thanks to our incredible clients and their families, who demonstrate every day the ability to overcome any challenge and live life to its full potential. You are our inspiration and our reason 'why'. We thank you for trusting us to support you in living a life of choice and inclusion.



TREASURER'S REPORT

Overview

Major disruptions to the world's economy continued well into the 2021/22 financial year. COVID-related lockdown, restrictions on travel and personal freedoms appear to have come to an end at the close of the financial year. The impacts of COVID will be felt across the globe for many years to come as government security payments dry up and our economy reacts to market-driven forces.

While many organisations in the disability and aged care sectors were unable to continue supports throughout the pandemic, others such as Coastlink recorded a surplus in the most trying of circumstances. Good internal management processes, government transfers and a clientele wanting to return to normal have seen Coastlink post its highest level of income at \$12.5M.

Coastlink continued to grow in the disability accommodation market, with more growth expected each year for the foreseeable future.

Arrangements with Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA) providers will see our supports grow without large capital outlays involved with owned and operated SDA properties. Still, Coastlink has invested well through the purchase of two properties in 2021/22. Coastlink has purchased the Day Program property it has used for the past few years in Berkeley Vale, as well as a property in Wyong to be used for SDA and Supported Independent Living (SIL) expansion.

Coastlink's Property Strategy suggests additional purchases will occur over the next few years, with Coastlink also providing SIL in these properties.

NDIS income was down on forecast primarily due to lost hours of support during COVID. A lesser reduction in expenses resulted from reduced direct labour costs. COVID-related sick leave increased the organisation's need to rely on overtime to fill shifts, with additional costs



being incurred from PPE and rapid antigen tests, all needed to keep both staff and clients safe throughout the pandemic.

Coastlink's profit after income tax was \$409K. With Coastlink's property assets being revalued, the total comprehensive income for the year was \$1.5M.

Coastlink has long held excess cash reserves with the intention of self-funding its Property Strategy. The purchase of the two properties, along with revaluations of existing properties has seen an increase in assets of \$3.2M. Liabilities also increased by \$1.7M including borrowings of \$1.5M for the properties. Net assets increased by \$1.5M showing the strong financial position of the organisation.

The one negative in the balance sheet was the increased level of trade and other receivables, which increased by \$1.0M over the twelve months. This primarily relates to NDIS income for supports in properties owned by a third party, which the NDIA has post-year advised they are willing to pay in full.

Reforms in aged care will change the way we deliver supports to this sector over the next few years. Coastlink welcomes the extension of the Commonwealth Home Support Programme to June 2024. Coastlink's aged care package application is expected to be approved in the first few months of 2022/23. Additional SIL opportunities, increased NDIS prices and a return to normal disability support levels will see Coastlink budget record income in excess of \$15M for the financial year.

Financial Results

Statement of Profit and Loss and Other Comprehensive Income


Despite many challenges, Coastlink's revenue continued to grow from \$12.2M in 2021 to \$12.5M in 2022, an increase of just over \$315K.

Reliance on government subsidies during the pandemic reduced over the twelve months from \$2.0M in 2020/21 to \$1.2M in 2021/22.

An increase in NDIS revenue of \$1.2M showed a start to the return of normal supports while reflecting growth in our accommodation options

The increase in staff numbers and soaring overtime saw employee costs rise from \$9.5M in 2020/21 to \$10.5M in 2021/22. This represents 83 percent of total revenues, up from 77 percent in the previous period, where government subsidies positively impacted Coastlink's bottom line.

Coastlink delivered a net operating surplus of \$409K.



Balance Sheet


As at 30 June 2022 Coastlink had total assets of \$12M comprising current (\$5.2M) and non-current (\$6.7M). The purchase of two properties changed our asset structure over the financial year. The increase in non-current assets will provide more opportunity for commercial growth through support provision in line with the organisation's Strategic Plan.

Coastlink's receivables have increased considerably over the past two years with NDIS invoices for onsite supports in our Gosford apartment buildings being difficult to collect. The NDIA introduced a "Concierge" model to provide unplanned supports to people living independently in the units. However, with multiple changes to the pricing and charging regimes, collection has been compromised. The NDIA has advised that all appropriately charged funds will be paid. As such, Coastlink has not provided for any bad debts in relation to the units.

Total liabilities have increased from \$1.6M in 2020/21 to \$3.3M as at 30 June 2022. This is primarily due to loans being taken up to fund the purchase of two properties.

Net equity increased by \$1.5M due to revaluations and a modest profit. Equity has grown consistently over the medium term as shown in the graph below.

The current ratio of 2.7 times reflects a strong position of solvency as we move into 2023.



Statement of Cash Flows

Our cash and cash equivalents as at 30 June was \$3.2M. This is a reduction over the financial year due to property purchases and increasing receivables. Cash flow for the 2022/23 year is expected to increase as the debtors relating to the Gosford apartments are collected.
